We are happily still thriving having had an excellent leave in Germany and now we have the prospect of having all our family in the country again, at least for a short while.

By the time you get this, Paul and Rosalind will be back from the United States, having had what appears to be a splendid time in California. Their pictures show a hedonistic life of sport, travel and pleasure – but coupled with lucrative hard work and, on both parts, vigorous community and conservation activities.

Stephen has oscillated between Milton Keynes and Germany which has given him the opportunity to keep up his friendships there and to visit us several times. His Company has been taken over by its German partner and this has given him promotion and the prospect of travel much further afield which he is looking forward to.

Meanwhile, Michael is in Paris with his Company having finished his time in Peterhead and Aberdeen. He has a lovely flat there and he and Nicola seem to be making the most of living in a splendid city. Nicola is now Clerk to the Justices in Bexley Heath which I suppose is not far from Paris, in modern terms!

We went back to our previous flat in Göttingen in April and renewed all our old frienships with the people in and around Jurgen Troe's hospitable group. Also we have some futher excitements to look forward to since I have decided to give up being Postgraduate Warden here and we expect to move off campus in the spring.
